Carol Dina Kleinman, age 79, passed away on February 6, 2024 following a brief illness.

She started and ran a successful lighting business in the DFW area for over 25 years, pioneering many practices still used today in construction. Arguably, her favorite job was being a blackjack dealer where she was known amongst many to have the loosest table and funniest jokes, making her very popular. Later in life, she was blessed enough to find her soulmate in Rabbi Sheldon Kleinman. Meeting online, it was a leap of faith at the time, but it was a perfect match, which lasted until the end.

She is preceded in death by her beloved parents, Max and Marcia Prushansky and her younger sister, Alyce Brand.

The next topic was Purim, which is on Saturday, March 23, 2024. Sisterhood will host this event. We will serve hot dogs (with David Reagler once again being our grill master), beer, and Hamantaschen. Millie Baron has a fun game—with prizes!—for us to enjoy. We also will celebrate our new members at this event.

Finally, we began discussing our congregation Seder for Passover, which begins at sundown Monday, April 22, 2024. Millie Baron volunteered to lead planning for a meal/services at CHI. Deadline for reservations will be April 1. Reservations can be taken at the Purim event. Pricing for the Passover Seder will be \$40 per member and \$50 per non-member guest. People under age 18 are free. The Seder menu will be decided upon at the March Sisterhood meeting.

Passover Foods Are Special

Passover is the celebration of the liberation of the oppressed and enslaved Jews from the Egyptian pharaoh, who refused Moses' pleas to "Let My People Go". The first night of Passover 2024 is on April 22, and lasts eight days, the last falling on April 30, 2024. Passover is considered by many Jews to be one of, if not the most significant Jewish holiday. Jews refrain from eating leavened foods—chametz—and eat matzah and dishes made with matzah. The special Passaic foods make the Passover celebration unique for Jews.

Matzah and dishes made with matzah are eaten in honor of the Children of Israel who left Egypt before their dough had time to rise.

Foods specially prepared for Passover will be labeled "Kosher for Passover", meaning it's been certified as such. In CHI's The Jewish Foodies Cookbook, assembled by our Sisterhood in 2014, a portion of the cookbook is devoted to traditional Passover recipes, including favorites submitted by Elaine Gartenberg (chocolate toffee matzah), Pat Tanenbaum (Gravlax, a salmon dish), Joanne Reagler (Passover charosis), Patti Fleischner (chocolate mousse cake and matzah brie), and several recipes contributed by Phyllis Hearn, including Passover brownies, a favorite for all of us.

The beautiful Passover Seders, and the eating of unleavened foods, remind Jews of the importance of the freedom we enjoy, and the significance of passing down traditions to every generation of Jews.

March Parshiot

Ki Tisa

March 2, 2024

When Moses does not return when expected from Mount Sinai, the people make a Golden Calf and worship it. G-d proposes to destroy the errant nation, but Moses intercedes on their behalf.

Moses descends from the mountain carrying the Tablets of the Testimony engraved with the Ten Commandments; seeing the people dancing about their idol, he breaks the Tablets, destroys the Golden Calf and has the primary culprits put to death. He then returns to G-d to say: "If You do not forgive them, blot me out from the book that You have written.



Vayak'heil

March 9, 2024

Moses assembles the people of Israel and reiterates to them the commandment to observe the Shabbat. He then conveys G-d's instructions regarding the making of the Mishkan (Tabernacle).

The people donate the required materials in abundance, bringing gold, silver, copper, blue, purple and red-dyed wool, goat hair, spun linen, animal skins, wood, olive oil, herbs and precious stones. Moses has to tell them to stop giving.

Pekudei

Mar 16, 2024

Moses makes an accounting of the gold, silver and copper donated by the people for the making of the Mishkan. Betzalel, Ahaliav and their assistants make the Eight Priestly Garments -- the Apron, Breastplate, Cloak, Crown, Hat, Tunic, Sash and Breeches -- according to the specifications communicated to Moses in the Parshah of Tetzaveh.

The Mishkan is completed and all its components are brought to Moses, who erects it and anoints it with the holy Anointing Oil, and initiates Aaron

and his four sons into the priesthood. A cloud appears over the Mishkan, signifying the Divine Presence that has come to dwell within it.

Vayikra

March 23, 2024

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Tzav

Mar 30, 2024

G-d instructs Moses to command Aaron and his sons regarding their duties and rights as ko-

hanim ("priests") who offer the korbanot (animal and meal offerings) in the Sanctuary.

The fire on the Altar must be kept burning at all times. In it are burned the wholly consumed ascending offering; veins of fat from the peace, sin and guilt offerings; and the "handful" separated from the meal offering. The kohanim eat the meat of the sin and guilt offerings, and the remainder of the meal offering.

The peace offering is eaten by the one who brought it, except for specified portions given to the kohen. The holy meat of the offerings must be eaten by ritually pure persons, in their designated holy place and within their specified time.

Aaron and his sons remain within the Sanctuary compound for seven days, during which Moses initiates them into the priesthood.

April Parshiot

Shemini

April 6, 2024

Aaron and his sons begin to officiate as Kohanim (priests); a fire issues forth from G-d to consume the offerings on the Altar and the Divine Presence comes to dwell in the Sanctuary.

Aaron's two elder sons, Nadav and Avihu, offer a "strange fire before G-d, which He commanded them not" and die before G-d. Aaron is silent in face of his tragedy.

G-d commands the kosher laws, identifying the animal species permissible and forbidden for consumption.



Tazria, Metzora

April 13, 20 2024

The Parshahs of Tazria and Metzora continue the discussion of the laws of *tumah v'taharah*, ritual impurity and purity.

Tzaraat (often mistranslated as "leprosy") is a supra-natural plague, which can afflict people as well as garments or homes. If white or pink patches appear on a person's skin (dark pink or dark green in garments or homes), a kohen is summoned. Judging by various signs, such as an increase in size of the afflicted area after a seven-day quarantine, the kohen pronounces it *tamei* (impure) or *tahor* (pure).

A person afflicted with *tzaraat* must dwell alone outside of the camp (or city) until he is healed. The afflicted area in a garment or home must be removed; if the *tzaraat* recurs, the entire garment or home must be destroyed.

When the *metzora* ("leper") heals, he or she is purified by the kohen with a special procedure involving two birds, spring water in an earthen vessel, a piece of cedar wood, a scarlet thread and a bundle of hyssop.
